Forensic Science Experience Day

Those students in year 10 who remained with us in the last week of term delved into the world of forensic science. They tried hands on analysis of all of the following: blood type analysis, fingerprint collection and identification, footwear mark analysis, blood spatter identification, hair and fibre collection and analysis, handwriting analysis, forged and deconstructed document retrieval, entomology [using insects to aid forensic analysis] and finally crime scene analysis. The day gave great exposure to the fascinating and varied world of forensics and many students took the time to



talk to the gunshot residue expert as well as the Police Superintendent who joined us on the day to offer their expertise.



University experiential programmes


9R Kestrel have made an enthusiastic start to Philosophy & Religion this year. They demonstrated excellent listening and communication skills in their first lesson.
