## Sixth Form

Biology Visit to the University of Worcester

On Tuesday Year 12 and 13 Biology students visited Worcester University to develop their study of certain A-level topics. The staff at the university put themselves out to make the day for us as enjoyable as possible. Year 12 learnt about ELISA tests, which can help determine whether a person has a disease or virus while the Year 13 students did tasks involving PCR's and gel electrophoresis. They also learnt about blood pressure and did practicals that helped them determine their own blood pressure.


## Year 12 Criminology

On the last day of term, the Year 12 Criminologists were joined by a visitor to support their work on campaigns for change. She introduced them to a campaign supporting the parents of premature babies. Hannah described how her work on radio, with her MP, social media and an art project enabled her to champion a change in a law. Inspired to make change of their own, the criminologists have spent the holidays looking at other campaigns that raise awareness, attract funding, change policy and
 change law.

This has been a large research project considering everything fro Natasha's Law in the food industry, to the \#MeToo movement. It has encouraged the group to reflect critically on why some campaigns for change succeed, and others do not.
