Our curriculum empowers students by giving them knowledge and skills that sustain the international community that they live in. It is demanding, engaging and diverse. It is planned and adapted to allow all students to enjoy their learning and make progress in understanding the world around them.

Students experience a broad curriculum through a comprehensive range of subjects. In most subjects, students follow a three year KS3 course (starting in Year 7), developing skills and knowledge preparing them for their chosen studies at KS4. You can find information on setting on page 7.

We make sure that we work on literacy and numeracy across all our

subjects. We also strive to make sure that social, moral, spiritual and cultural issues and themes are tackled across the curriculum too (e.g. looking at genetic engineering in Science or racism or misogyny in historical texts in English) as well as in our tutor programme to make sure the young people of Droitwich are prepared for the modern world. Extra-curricular opportunities offer students exposure to an assortment of sports, as well as Duke of Edinburgh, STEM activities, the Creative Arts, charity, and community events. An assortment of local and overseas visits and trips are offered too.

Subject specialists plan lessons to maximise learning time, engaging in meaningful academic work plus teaching positive and productive learning habits to aid their learning inside and outside of the classroom. We will be in touch in September with more information about homework and what parents can do to support with studying at home.

### **HOUSES**



#### **BULMAN HOUSE-LEAD BY MISS HANDS**

Bulman House is named after Dr Jenny Bulman, who has lived locally for many years. Her work with other volunteers has done much to support people in this county. Most notably this has been through the creation of St Richard's Hospice, initially run from Droitwich and now a greatly valued Worcestershire institution.

#### D'OLIVEIRA HOUSE-LED BY MR JACOBS

D'Oliveira House is named after Basil D'Oliveira, who spent the early part of his life in South Africa before moving to England and settling in Worcester. As a cricketer he was not only highly successful when he represented the county and for England, he also played a significant part in bringing about peaceful change in South Africa.





#### PARKS HOUSE-LED BY MR KIRK

Parks House is named after Rosa Parks, the American woman whose simple gesture became an inspiration for the American civil rights movement in the middle years of the last century. Her refusal to give up her seat on a bus in Alabama stood as a symbol for those who wanted to bring racial segregation to an end.

#### **ROWLING HOUSE-LED BY MR BROWN**

Rowling House is named after JK Rowling, who was born in Bristol but grew up in Gloucestershire. She is a British novelist best known for writing the Harry Potter fantasy series.



#### WINSLOW HOUSE-LED BY MR HOOK

Winslow House is named after Edward Winslow, the Droitwich man who sailed with his wife on the Mayflower and was prominent among the Pilgrim Fathers. He was among the founders of the settlements that eventually became New England and went on to become the first of the United States.

### THE DSHS WAY



These three principles are fundamental to a happy and successful school.

We expect our students to follow these principles in all areas of school life. However, this is not confined to the students. All members of the high school community are expected to adhere to these values and strive to ensure that the DSHS Way is central to our work.

We want all of our students to recognise the importance of being ready to learn, being kind to others and being respectful within the school community.

### YEAR 8 CURRICULUM

#### **SETTING / GROUPS**

3.

In September the students will be in four different groupings.

1. Tutor Group. Students are in this grouping for tutor time and for their lessons in Art, DT, Music, Food and Nutrition and PSHE. The groupings are small so that practical activities can be done safely. They are mixed prior attainment and we prioritise the 'soft' data from feeder schools as much as possible, whilst also making sure that new starters join the same house as their elder siblings.

 Core Set A. Students are in this set for English, Geography and History, RE, Languages and Computer Science.

These sets are mixed prior attainment (with the exception of our Access group)

but different to their tutor group, whilst still paying attention to the 'soft' data. Core Set B. Students are in this set for Maths, and Science. These sets take into account the 'soft' data but are driven by prior academic attainment. The sets are


named after European cities.
4. PE sets. Students are in gender groupings.

#### LESSONS (HOURS) PER FORTNIGHT

The Access groups have a different mix of lessons but most students follow this pattern (hours per fortnight):

English 8, Maths 6, Science 7, French 5, or Spanish 5 Geography 2, History 3, Art 2, RE 2, Computer Science 3, Design Technology, Food and Nutrition 2, Music 2, PSHE 2, PE 4. You can find out more about what Year 8 students study in each subject in the Curriculum Summary booklet which is on the website.

In March of 2024 students have an opportunity to personalise their timetable for Year 9. They may choose to continue studying their language option as well as German whilst also selecting two (or only one if they have chosen two languages) from Art, Dance, DT, Drama, Food and Music for study in Year 9.

The school operates a two-week timetable; Week A and Week B which are largely symmetrical. Students will receive a printed copy of their timetable from their tutor on their first day and can access an electronic copy via the MyDSHSapp which can be downloaded onto their mobile phones.

For each taught part of the day; tutor and lesson time the timetable outlines the following information

### UNIFORM AND DRESS CODE

You can find our uniform list on our website (alongside all of our other policies). The list also includes where you get the items from.

The school blazer is now only available online. If you wish you can visit school to try on a blazer from our sizing set. You can also avoid the postage cost by having the blazer delivered to school.

Tracy Lakin is happy to meet parents and new starters after school Mondays to Thursdays between 3.130pm and 4pm until the end of term, to answer any uniform questions and to try items on.

We continue to have a good working relationship with ACE Essentials; you can get the logo'd PE polo shirt and school tie from them as well as all of the other 'off the shelf items' like shirts, skirts and trousers etc.

Areas of specific concern with uniform are:

- School shoes must be all black (but trainer style shoes are OK as long as they are leather or faux leather; no canvas)
- leggings are not acceptable
- false nails are not acceptable
- a hoodie (even if it has a zip) or a sweatshirt is not a substitute for a coat and shouldn't be worn. If it is made from sweatshirt material it is not acceptable.



NB: the pages in the uniform list relating to piercings, hair cuts etc. are out of date but will be updated later this month. You can use the document linked to above straight away to work out what clothing you need to buy (that is not changing) and we will send out a revised school uniform and dress code document in a couple of weeks' time.

## **DSHS AND ICT / COMMUNICATIONS**

#### **STUDENTS**

Each student has a Microsoft 365 account. This gives them:

- a school email address that can be accessed on any device.
- a school Microsoft OneDrive (where they store their documents so they can be accessed on site but also offsite on any device).
- the ability to use the web versions of Word, Excel, PowerPoint etc. on any device
- the ability to download the latest version of Microsoft Office on to personal devices (free of charge).

Students are shown how to access this during their first few ICT lessons.

Students will also have access to our app that allows them to:

- view their timetable
- see what homework they have been set and when it is due in
- see how many positive reward points they have received (and from where)
- buy treats with their reward points (e.g. sweet treat, free item from the café, Nando's voucher etc).
- see their attendance

In addition, students can access the DSHS Launchpad, which is our intranet site. On here they can access the shared drives from each department, where there will be extra reading, past exam papers etc.

#### **PARENTS**


We hope our website (search for Droitwich Spa High) will have everything you need, including contact details for the Senior Leadership Team, each Head of House and each Head of Department. If there is something you cannot find please contact us.

We will always default to sending communication home via email. Please check your welcome letter carefully—if the email address is incorrect or missing (or you would like to change it) please let us know straight away on 01905 774421. If we have incorrect details it is likely you will miss important communication. If, in September, you are not receiving the school newsletter via email (normally weekly) then it is likely you are also missing other letters home.

All of our student information is stored in a system called Arbor. You will be sent details (via email) of how to log in to the Parent Portal of Arbor (or download and login to the Arbor app if you prefer).

In the Arbor Parent Portal (or App) you will be able to:

- Check and update the parent/guardian/emergency contact details that we have on file
- add/update medical conditions, allergies and GP information
- give consent for first aid and the use of biometric information
- give consent for school visits / clubs
- view your child(ren)'s timetable
- check your child(ren)'s attendance
- view your child(ren)'s school reports
- see your child(ren)'s homework
- track your child(ren)'s praise points
- pay for school visits etc.

### PRACTICAL TIPS TO HELP YOUR CHILD PREPARE

For students who are moving from middle school to secondary school the summer can be a time of mixed emotions; excitement about a new start but apprehensive about what to expect. The bullet points below outline some strategies and suggestions to help make a smooth transition for you all.

### Getting to school

- Practice the route to school using the method of transport they will be using preferably at the time of day they will be travelling to help anticipate traffic or busy roads.
- Discuss with your child what they would do if....they missed their bus, lost their bus pass etc.
- Chatting to older siblings, relatives or friends about what to expect on the bus can be reassuring.
- Given them emergency numbers in their school bags.
- Ask them to text you when they arrive safely at school.
- Arrange for them to walk with friends.
- Remind them of the entrance they need to use on their first day.
- Suggest they arrange a meeting place on the school site to meet friends when they arrive.

### Being ready and managing new routines

- Read the school map and their timetable together.
- Suggest they copy out their timetable, with different colours for each subject and place somewhere visible to help manage their equipment and books for each lesson.
- Encourage them to pack their schoolbag the night before, checking their timetable and MyDSHSapp so they have all additional equipment and know whether it is Week A or Week B.
- Issue students with a plastic folder to carry worksheets and homework so they remain neatly presented.
- Find a secure section of their bags for their mobile phone, bus pass and loose change.

### Settling in and making new friends

- Getting involved in extracurricular activities and house competitions is a great way of getting to know students in different classes and year groups.
- If they are feeling nervous it might be helpful to have a conversation so they can express their feelings and they can be reassured that everyone is in the same situation at the start of the year.
- They may feel apprehensive that they haven't made new friends in the early days, assure them that friendships take time to develop.

#### Taking time to settle

- New friendships can take time to build and students may feel upset when this
  happens. Reassure them that it takes time to make new friends. If you are
  worried do get in touch with their tutor.
- Suggest they join a club or get involved in a house competition or activity as a
  way to meet new students in other tutor groups, classes and year groups.
  Our social media is a great place to get an idea of the clubs, activities and
  competitions that have happened.
- Older siblings and relatives in the school are good to talk to about their concerns.

### Leaving homework to the last minute

- Using a calendar/planner write down the deadlines for each subject homework in different colours.
- Create a quiet space for them to do their homework, away from distractions.
- Help them to prioritise homework into immediate and longer term activities to meet specified deadlines.

### Taking longer than expected to complete homework

- If this is happening infrequently—don't panic it may be they have found the work slightly more challenging than previous homework, or were really interested and did additional research or simply wanted to do a good job and took their time.
- If this is happening more regularly have a chat .Discuss if they understand what is required, they may not be clear on the level of detail required and are trying to do too much, or are finding the work hard.
- If you find this is happening routinely, encourage them to approach their teacher and ask for help. If they lack the confidence to do this do contact the school office or the subject teacher who will be happy to discuss the situation.

#### THE FIRST DAY

New Year 8s should make their way to the Sports Hall at 08.45 on Wednesday 4th September where their tutor will be ready to collect them and guide them to their tutor room.

Year 8 will spend some time in their tutor groups getting to know one another and their tutor on the first day. They will also have a year group assembly. During the first day they will also have their thumb scanned for the cashless catering (see later pages).

For the duration of the first week Year 8 will go to lunch slightly earlier than the rest of school and will also have a slightly earlier finish time (3pm instead of 3.10pm) to get them acclimatised in quieter conditions.

### **CATERING AT DSHS**

We have been providing catering in house for many years. Students can enjoy a range of healthy and popular food at breakfast, break-time and lunchtime, which complies with the School Food Plan and School Food Standards Regulations. We regard the manner in which it is purchased, delivered and served as a key priority in order for it to play a constructive part in the education of children.







We operate in three catering outlets:

- The Big Apple which is situated between the Science Block and the Main Classroom Block
- 2. The Little Apple Cafe in the S&T Block at the far end of the school site
- 3. The Apple Core in the Sixth Form Area.

On the last inspection from Worcester Regulatory Services, we again received the 5-Star Food Hygiene Rating, as we have since 2010.

Students buy their food using a cashless biometric system. This employs the latest technology to eliminate the need to carry cash throughout the day. The system works by taking measurements of the thumbprint, but it **does not**\_capture a complete image. This means that the original thumbprint cannot be reconstructed from the data used. Schools are not allowed to use biometric information for any reason other than the express purpose for which it was collected

Under GDPR regulations, biometric permission is required prior to the thumb scan on the first day of term; there is an alternative of a pin number if permission is not received.

There is a wide variety of menu choices, all of which are prepared on site. The menus and price lists are on the School Website and on the DSHS Launchpad and are based around the school timetable of Week A & Week B. Allergen information is available on menu content for all items.

The food offer is as follows with Meat Free Mondays every week:

Hot snack meals in a pot
Hot vegetarian snack meals in a pot
Hot tasty snack choices
Jacket potatoes with fillings
Baguettes, sandwiches and wraps
Salad and cold pasta pots
Fruit and home-made yogurt
Home-baked cakes and cookies
Cold drinks and ice-creams

### Payment for catering is made using Arbor Pay.

Arbor Pay is not only used for adding credit for school meals, but also is the necessary requirement for trip payments, revision guides, workbooks, DofE expeditions, prom and theatre tickets etc.

Arbor Pay is inside the Arbor Parent App. For more details about the app please see page 11.

### How much credit is on a student's catering account?

The catering account balance can be found on your Arbor Parent App or students can check their balance at the tills after being served. It is essential to stay in credit for School Meals if students wish to purchase food or drink.

A loan can be requested if funds are low and e-payments have not yet come through the system or if students have forgotten to bring food from home.

Repayment is made directly once the Arbor Pay account is topped up. If you would prefer not to have loans applied, please advise by emailing the school kitchen.

#### Transaction details

If you would like to know more about what particular items are being purchased with the money allocated to school meals you can see this in the Arbor Parent App too.

### **Pupil Spending Limits**

Each student has a spending limit on his or her catering account of £5 per service unless we are instructed otherwise. If you would like to set a different limit, such as a total amount to spend per day or some at break or lunch, this can be arranged by emailing the school kitchen with student's name, tutor group and your preferences. These will then be entered on the system. This is especially helpful when paying a larger amount online instead of making daily payments, thus ensuring it is not all spent quickly.
