

Jessica Bodilly and Amelia Burton are showing themselves to be promising students of English. Their work is consistently of a high standard and the result of a great deal of effort.




In Science students have created snowflakes by evaporating salt solution and allowing it to form salt crystals. These are made by Abigail Parmley.

Free School Meal Entitlement

Who can apply for free school meals?

Free School Meals can only be awarded if you or your partner are claiming either;

- Universal Credit provided they have an annual net earned income not exceeding £7,400 (616.67 per month)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by HMRC
- Working Tax Credit run-on-paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax

What happens after I have completed my application?

- free School Meals cannot be granted to any child until a correctly completed form is received
- your eligibility for Free School Meals will be checked online
- entitlement to free school meals cannot be backdated
- if you qualify for a Free School Meal under the benefit criteria, a letter will be sent to you confirming your Free School Meal Award
- the school will also be informed
- a daily free school meal allowance will automatically be added onto the students catering account at Droitwich Spa High School
- the free school meal allowance is currently £2.70 at Droitwich Spa High School
- the allowance can be spent at break or lunch but must include food items such as a hot snack, meal pots, baguette, sandwich or wrap and NOT just a drink or a cake
- at the till point, the free school meal entitlement is not evident to other users apart from the till operator
