The Karen Moore Award for Creative Writing



We are pleased to announce the winner of this year's Karen Moore Award for Creative Writing, sponsored by the Droitwich Arts Network.

More than forty entries were received from across the school, each trying to win the trophy and the cash prize of £100. After much deliberation, the first round judges – Helen Karakashian, chair of the Droitwich Arts Network and Karen Moore, ex Deputy Head of the High School – chose a short list of four entries. These were sent to Katie Bowen, a former Head Girl of the High School, who is now studying English at The Queen's College Oxford. The four entries chosen as finalists were by Isobel Sprague in Year 10, Rhiannon Green also in Year 10, Mary-Jane Peace in Year 8 and Eva Palmer in Year 11. All were all judged to be very strong. Katie finally decided that the winner was by Isobel in Year 10, with Rhiannon as runner

up.

The award was established in 2019 following the retirement of Mrs Karen Moore, for many years the Deputy Head at the school. Mrs Moore said: 'As this is the fourth year we have run the competition, I am delighted that the number of entries continues to go up and that entries are coming in from year groups across the school, with some of the younger students showing exceptional writing skills which bodes well for the future. We always try to give a title which allows students to give their own interpretation and this year the title was 'The Silence of the Crowd.' The diversity of ideas

across the entries was astonishing. In short, we have read a lot of creative thinking and writing which is exactly the purpose of the competition.'

Without wanting to be controversial or political, the English department accepts that the exam boards are making these changes to diversify the offerings and to make literature more inclusive. This is not to take away from current pieces or the authors studied, but to allow students to study underrepresented groups such as women, differently-abled, Black, Asian and minority ethnic writers.





Athletics News

Following her success in the Hereford and Worcestershire Athletics Track and Field Championships, Bea Rusby competed in the 3000m at Stoke on Trent on the 18th June in the Mason's Trophy event. Bea came 7th, improving on her qualifying time; we congratulate Bea on this huge achievement.



Pippa Lang, Josh Shuck and Arthur Wilkinson all qualified to represent Bromsgrove and Droitwich District in the Minor Counties event at Nunnery Wood High School on Wednesday 29th June. Pippa gave a strong performance in the discus and Josh ran a determined race to gain 2nd place in his heat for the 200m. Arthur won the shot putt with a spectacular distance of 13.23m. Sixth Form

Year 12 Biology students have spent part of the week carrying out ecology field work in North Yorkshire. They investigated bioenergetics within a marine ecosystem on Filey Brig beach, catching plenty of crabs (Jasmine Kilmartin was our ultimate crab catcher!) They delved into streams to investigate the impact of crayfish on the local freshwater ecosystems. Ewan Sanders, Mary-Ellen Poynton, Phoebe Williams and Heidi Shumba caught the biggest crayfish, which they called Petra. The group set up various scientific traps to survey woodland mammals and invertebrates. The final day was spent in Wharram Quarry, an area of scientific interest, where they investigated succession.

The Intermediate Biology Olympiad results for Y12 have now been published.






Peripatetic Music Lessons
